Do remember that is not compartmentalized, so be sure to make connections between the literature we study and events in American history.

Readings for the year will include but are not limited to:

Unit 1- National Origins: Native American myth, Explorer narrative, Slave narrative
Unit 2- Puritans: "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" by Jonathan Edwards; *The Crucible* by Arthur Miller
Unit 3- Foundations: Speeches by Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, etc.
Unit 4- American Identity: Transcendental Literature (by Emerson, Thoreau, & Whitman)
Unit 5- Fractured Identity: *The Great Gatsby*, by F. Scott Fitzgerald

****Each unit has a project/presentation component and a writing component which will comprise the bulk of the grade for the unit.***

7. For better understanding, be sure to make connections between American history and the texts we read.

Cheating
