CAN WE GET BACK TO NORMAL?

What does "normal" look like in 2022? With the ups and downs of COVID, learning loss, staffing shortages, and other hurdles to jump, people seem to agree that defining normal can be pretty confusing these days.

The past year has seen the continued impact of the COVID-19 fallout along with an inflation surge that has and continues to wreak havoc on vulnerable families. Some are in-transition and many are just barely getting by. Rent and gas prices have skyrocketed contributing to a rise in eviction notices and utility delinquencies. Parents of students describe the difficulty of getting students to "re-engage" with school and academics, while food bank and mental health referrals have been the program's most requested resources.

In place since 2014, the HOPE Program worked hard to respond to the flood of requests for assistance. Working in alliance with numerous community and faith-based organizations in the Chino Valley, students and their families were supported in a variety of ways.

WE CAN'T DO IT ALONE

Working collaboratively allows us to accomplish more to attain greater results but this requires empathy, support, kindness, and leaning on each other. Here are a few examples of some wonderful community partners willing to step up to fill the gap in support of our community's children, youth, and their families:

Inland Hills Church provided year-round fresh food deliveries for families facing food insecurity. Additionally, Inland Hills gave \$1,000 towards the replenishment of hygiene and emergency supplies for the Community CARE Closet.

Chino Valley Released Time Christian Education provided HOPE a donation of \$2,500 in gas gift cards for families struggling with gas and transportation costs and \$5,000 in gift cards during the holidays.

California Institution for Men (CIM) provided holiday gift sponsorships for students identified homeless and their families. CIM staff delivered presents and gift cards to children & youth throughout the Chino Valley. The organization also provided \$1,500 for needed supplies for the Community CARE Closet.

HOPE & CARE CLOSET

The HOPE Family Resource Centers strive to identify and remove barriers that could keep children and youth from being successful academically and at a personal level. In the 2021/22 school year, a total of **2,855** individuals were assisted through various community partnerships and available resources.

A SHARED SUCCESS STORY...

Sandra (name has been changed) is a single mom of three children who became injured at work in November 2021, and ultimately fell behind on her rent. The family lost their housing and became homeless. Without family to assist, no vehicle to their name, and very little money, the family found themselves at a local motel. After getting in touch with the HOPE Center, a case manager began working closely with mom and three students. Transportation was arranged to make certain the students could continue attending school without disruption. The family received emergency hygiene supplies, clothing, and school supplies from the CARE Closet. A program partner assisted with motel vouchers which allowed the family to stay sheltered until finding alternative housing.

An EXCEL case manager worked closely with the oldest student, an 11th grader, to ensure college plans were not sidelined. The family was sponsored that December by local community agencies and was given food and gifts. The family expressed sincere gratefulness for the support and kindness shown to them by the Chino Valley community. One year later, the family continues to benefit from case management support and goal setting. Sandra has even enrolled in classes at CVUSD Adult School.
