The first hurricane to hit Florida was Tropical Storm Helene (or Hurricane Helene), which first arrived on Tuesday, September 24th, 2024. of the buildings to be repaired or rebuilt due to the massive amount of damage that took place from the wind and heavy rain.

Hurricane Milton is said to be a historical storm by many reporters, as it not only spawned the tropical storm, but also a tornado within the span of Milton passing through before dissipating.

People have lost many lives during the two hurricanes, and many are still out there searching for their family and loved ones, hoping to find them unharmed after the two storms. We put all our thoughts and prayers toward Florida, wishing a speedy recovery from the tragedies.

Due to the backlash on the matter, it is unclear whether the rule will stick. From the overview of how students are reacting to it, it won't be long before the rules will be altered.

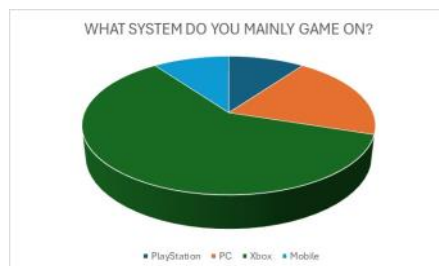
PS5 Pro: Future of Gaming or Expensive Upgrade?

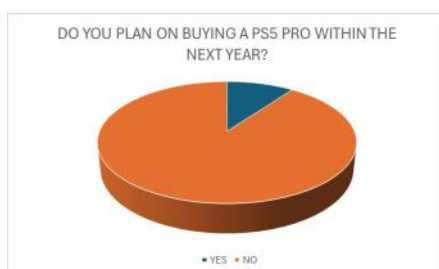
Gaming giant Sony recently announced the long-awaited upgrade to the PS5, aptly named the PS5 Pro, and is expected to be released on November 7th, 2024. They promise to bring several upgrades, however, the price tag is making several gamers reconsider.

According to Sony, the PS5 Pro vows to be the most visually impressive console of this generation. They list three major upgrades to their system: first being an "Upgraded GPU" for making gameplay smoother, second being advanced "Ray Tracing" for more dynamic lighting, and third being an "AI-Driven Upscaling" to provide sharper images and details. Nevertheless, gamers are apprehensive about purchasing the console due to its steep price of \$699.99. The PS5 Pro will be a 'Digital Only' console, meaning that it will cost an extra \$80 for the disc drive. For many gamers this has killed the hype of the gaming system and while it is the highest selling console currently on Amazon, it is not selling out like the PS5 did back in 2020. Additionally, back when the PS4 Pro launched in the Fall of 2016, it only cost \$400 and the price of the original PS4 was reduced to \$200. Meanwhile, the original PS5 that is now a 4-year-old console still costs \$500.

Students were asked around campus what they thought. They were asked what console they mainly play games on. Results showed that 60% of the sample group were Xbox gamers, while only 10% played on PlayStation. The remaining 30% were PC and mobile phone gamers.



They were then asked if they planned on buying a PS5 Pro within the next year. Results from the polls showed overwhelmingly 90% 'No'. Most of the subjects preferred to continue with their current systems and did not see any reason to upgrade.



When being asked if they thought \$699.99 was a fair price for a 'Digital Only' console. The results showed that 100% of the subjects thought that the PS5 Pro was too expensive and not a fair price. They were then asked what they thought a fair price would be, with a majority answering between the \$400 to \$500 dollar range.



While Sony intends to move forward with the release of the PS5 Pro, it seemingly does not look like it will be the next must have gaming system anytime soon. The release of the PS5 Pro marks a half-way point for this generation of game systems, yet many intend to skip and wait for the PS6.

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increase in social development and social interactions among the students because of the new phone protocols.

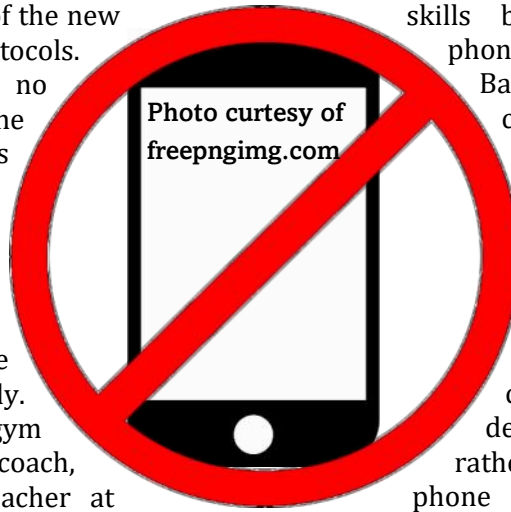
